Report of the Secretary-General on the financial situation of the International Research and Training Institute for the Advancement of Women

Report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions

1. The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions has considered an advance version of the report of the Secretary-General on the financial situation of the International Research and Training Institute for the Advancement of Women (INSTRAW) (A/61/897). During its consideration of the report, the Advisory Committee met with the Director of INSTRAW and representatives of the Secretary-General, who provided clarifications and additional information.

2. In his report, the Secretary-General responded to the request of the General Assembly, in its decision 61/555, to report to the Assembly, at the second part of its resumed sixty-first session in May 2007, on the financial situation of the Institute for 2007. The Advisory Committee recalls that in paragraph 10 of resolution 60/229, the Assembly decided to provide its full support to the current efforts to revitalize the Institute and, in this regard, to provide it with the requisite funds to enable it to carry out its core functions for the biennium 2006-2007. In its decision 61/555, the Assembly decided, on an exceptional basis, to authorize the Secretary-General to enter into commitments for the financing of INSTRAW in an amount of up to US\$ 190,000, under section 9, Economic and social affairs, of the programme budget for the biennium 2006-2007, subject to full reimbursement, pending receipt of voluntary contributions. In its decision on the statement of programme budget implications contained in document A/C.5/60/16, the Assembly took note of the indication in paragraph 18 of the Secretary-General's statement that "the provision of additional funds to finance operations of the Institute in 2007 would imply an annual subvention to the Institute, which is subject to the express decision of the



General Assembly in this regard and to the amendment of article VIII of the statute of the Institute". The General Assembly, by its resolution 60/247, appropriated an amount of \$1,042,200 for the biennium 2006-2007, to be used for INSTRAW should there be a shortage of voluntary contributions for the functioning of the Institute in 2006. In 2006, the appropriation of \$1,042,200 was transferred to the Trust Fund for INSTRAW (see annex I).

3. Regarding the INSTRAW Trust Fund for core activities, pledges for 2007, as at 21 May, amount to \$402,600 and €60,000, of which \$20,617 were received (see annex II). Concerning the INSTRAW Trust Fund for special projects, as at 21 May 2007, an amount of \$2,727,000 was pledged and \$5,260 received (see annex III). **The Advisory Committee encourages INSTRAW to pursue its efforts to diversify its donor base. In the case of pledged funds, the Committee urges INSTRAW to ascertain, wherever possible, their expected date of receipt and to withdraw from its relevant statements long outstanding pledges unlikely to materialize.**

4. INSTRAW currently provides a series of services in Santo Domingo to the United Nations Stabilization Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH) for its disaster recovery centre. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that MINUSTAH and INSTRAW had signed, in November 2006, a memorandum of understanding providing for the reimbursement to the Institute of a fixed monthly cost of \$13,875. Accordingly, MINUSTAH owes \$41,625 for services rendered by INSTRAW from December 2006 to February 2007. These funds will be recorded as miscellaneous income.

5. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was also informed that a 4 per cent programme support cost was charged against the Trust Fund for core activities. The amount was being utilized to provide support from Headquarters to process the salary payments of all international staff and to issue allotments to the Institute. Effective September 2005, a 13 per cent programme support cost was being charged against the INSTRAW Trust Fund for special activities. Prior to that date, no programme support cost had been charged against the Trust Fund for special projects owing to the very low level of voluntary contributions received. On 14 May 2007, the Director of INSTRAW had submitted a request to Headquarters that the programme support cost funds charged against the Trust Fund for special activities be used to defray the cost of core activities. That request was currently being analysed. **The Advisory Committee is of the opinion that the decision on this matter should be expedited.**

6. The Advisory Committee notes from table 2 of the report of the Secretary-General the imbalance between contributions for the Institute's core and earmarked special project activities. With regard to core Trust Fund contributions, a total of \$6,160 was received and a further \$322,100 was pledged. With regard to projects, or earmarked Trust Fund contributions including voluntary funds, a total of \$1,077,266 was committed by donors, but has yet to be recorded as pledges in the accounts. **The Advisory Committee notes that the Institute's efforts to increase contributions to the core Trust Fund have so far yielded very little response. The level of earmarked contributions significantly exceeds core contributions. The Committee believes that the extent to which core resources are used to support earmarked projects merits close examination. It considers that the fundamental issues confronting INSTRAW remain unresolved: the requirement to operate**

on the basis of voluntary funding on the one hand and the insufficiency of such funding to date on the other.

Conclusion

7. The Secretary-General indicates in paragraphs 12 and 13 of his report that it is estimated that, with the application of the \$190,000 commitment authority approved by the General Assembly in its decision 61/555, an additional commitment of \$647,900 would be required to finance the activities of INSTRAW through the end of 2007. The estimated requirements for INSTRAW for 2007 are \$90,800 lower than the 2007 initial estimates of \$1,589,300 approved by the INSTRAW Executive Board. The \$190,000 commitment authority and the additional requirement of \$647,900 are over and above the \$1,042,200 appropriated under section 9, Economic and social affairs, of the programme budget for the biennium 2006-2007 for INSTRAW, which has been transferred to the Trust Fund for core activities.

8. **The Advisory Committee draws attention to the reaffirmation by the General Assembly in paragraph (d) of its decision 61/555 that regular budget resources shall not be used to finance the activities of the Institute, in accordance with articles VI and VII of its statute. The Committee considers that the sustainability of INSTRAW needs to be carefully examined. Furthermore, its budget should be formulated in such a way as to be more closely aligned with the volume of voluntary resources available to it.**

9. **Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was informed that the Executive Board of INSTRAW would be meeting on 30 May 2007. Subject to approval of the Institute's budget by the Executive Board and the payment of further voluntary contributions, the proposal of the Secretary-General would entail authorizing the Secretary-General, on an exceptional basis, to enter into commitments in the amount of \$647,900.**
